






New Spotlight:

Dr. Jeannette Lager!





Jeannett Lager, MD, MPH is a Professor in Minimally Invasive Gynecology Surgery. She treats women with fibroids, abnormal uterine bleeding, ovarian cysts and endometriosis. She is the Associate Director of the UCSF Center for Endometriosis.

She is also the Director of Medical Student Education in OBGYN, and the Clinical Clerkship Director for Obstetrics and Gynecology for the School of Medicine.

Below is an excerpt from her spotlight, conducted by medical student Rachel Mundaden, that is now live on the MSS website!

Why did you decide to pursue minimally invasive gynecologic surgery?

"I became interested in minimally invasive gynecologic surgery because I've always loved surgical procedures and the ability to identify a diagnosis, offer treatment options, and see patients improve their quality of life. That's what really inspires me to do the work—to be able to treat patients and focus on a patient-centered approach to provide minimally invasive surgical options. It enables patients to recover quickly and return to their normal activities. The complexity and advancing surgical techniques is a part of surgical practice that I absolutely love."

What is the best piece of advice you have received?

"People always say, don't say yes to everything. Know your boundaries. But I think that it's also important to say yes to the things that you find interesting and want to do, because, generally speaking, those are worth the sacrifice. It opens doors to things that you might not ever otherwise do. When opportunities come up that may not have time, percentage, pay, or anything that's associated with it, if it is something that really lights a fire inside, I think that's something that is worth taking on."

Be on the lookout for the **MSS Fall Suturing Potluck** happening this month on **September 19th, 6-8pm**, location on Parnassus campus to be announced!


