



Juneteenth commemorates the end of slavery in the United States. It marks the day on June 19, 1865, when enslaved African Americans were informed that they were free – 2.5 years after President Lincoln had signed the Emancipation Proclamation!

Why do we celebrate Pride Month in June?

The Stonewall riots began on June 28, 1969 and marked a turning point in the LGBTQ movement for civil rights. The riot began when a group of people at the Stonewall Inn, a gay bar in New York City, were being harassed by police officers. The harassment by police wasn't new to the bar's patrons, but that night the community rose up against it. The decision of a few brave Stonewall Inn patrons to fight back and stand against police brutality and injustice kicked off days of demonstrations throughout the city to protest the discrimination and mistreatment of gay and lesbian communities.

UCSF has begun implementing the University of California's Gender Recognition and Lived Name (GRLN) policy, aligning with their PRIDE Values to create an inclusive environment. The policy allows individuals to be recognized with their accurate gender identity and lived name, offering at least three gender options and the ability to use lived names in the UC system. The goal is to fully implement the policy by June 2024, emphasizing the importance of using correct names, pronouns, and fostering a sense of belonging for everyone in the UCSF community.
